Moved to Make a Difference



"In Foley, in Winfield, in Elsberry, I pass by abject poverty. I drive up Highway 79 to and from my home and I see it every day."

David Orthwein says it's his Catholic faith that inspires him to try to do good things in the face of great need. "I want to fulfill what the Bible tells us — to resist following the desires of our own heart, to keep trying, even if we fall short."

Recently, Mr. Orthwein entrusted a significant gift to the Society of St. Vincent de Paul's Bridge to Stability Program in Lincoln County. Bridges is providing lifechanging assistance for neighbors facing a particular hardship that is blocking their pathway to a better life. Bridges helps fill the gap when urgent requests fall beyond that which a single parish conference can meet.

According to a study recently commissioned by United Way of Greater St. Louis, 58% of the households in Lincoln County do not make enough to meet their basic living needs including housing, food and transportation.

For Orthwein, who lives in nearby Pike County, the gift is one he feels can make a difference beyond just the material help.

Many charities are helping the poor. But David says that for him, there is an important difference with the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. "It's very much a parishbased outreach, driven by the time, talent, and treasure

we can give to it. With a major grant, I know I am empowering Catholics in local parishes to help the people right there in the communities and neighborhoods where they live."

"It is a very different thing to donate to a cause than to donate to people," Orthwein says. "The society of St. Vincent de Paul is about the people. It's one-on-one. And I think that's incredibly powerful."

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"I'm just not used to having good things happen to me," Jim Lampson admits. "What you all have allowed me to have ... it is a life saver."

Born with clubbed feet, Jim didn't walk until he was nearly eight years old. He endured dozens of surgeries growing up and even served as a "poster child" for Shriner's Hospital in St. Louis. As a teen, Lampson was injured in two separate motor vehicle accidents. In the past decade, he has dealt with a worsening back condition. The chronic disabilities have left him with very limited mobility. Most days, he says, he sits at his window and looks out. "That's my life," he says.

This 62-year-old former lawn mower repairman offers his grateful thanks to everyone whose donations





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to the Society of St. Vincent de Paul allowed for the construction of a much-needed accessible bathroom.

Before the renovation, he and his wife Donna had a conventional bathtub and shower head. "But it was horrible," Jim says. "And it would take two people to help me get in and out of the thing. I'll tell you what. I was ready to take a power saw and just try to cut the thing up so I could get in it."

Donna heard about possible help from the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, through the St. Vincent de Paul Conference at Immaculate Conception in Old Monroe. She called and explained the need.

Thanks to the Society's Bridge to Stability Program in Lincoln County, the Council office was able to help the Conference pay for the walk-in shower, grab bars, vanity and commode...essentially a new bathroom that would allow Jim Lampson to get by much more independently.

The Lampson's log home was built in 1983 and its settling over the years has left some structural changes that made for extra challenges in completing the renovation. "We moved here in 1991; a few years later, some windows wouldn't open and close. There was snow coming in. You wonder what the heck is happening here. You learn in life."

The Lampsons have faced other recent losses, too. In the past year, Jim's sister passed away, and they lost their 35-year-old son in a tragic accident.

"Before my son died, I never prayed. Now, I pray every day. I'm working to keep some kind of hope here," says Jim. "We've got food to eat, and we've got a pretty good family. So I'm just trying to stay with it ... What you guys did was the best thing that has happened to me in a long time."

Butch Henke helped start his parish's outreach to neighbors in need back in 1984.

"Two other men and I who belong to Immaculate Conception in Old Monroe saw a need. We felt like there were a lot of hungry people in our area. So, we started a little food pantry in the rectory basement," Henke says.

Over the years, that effort grew. The group responded by helping pay utility bills, rent and sending volunteer carpenters and plumbers to repair homes. Eventually, their small parish ministry became a St. Vincent de Paul Conference, one of 142 chapters whose Vincentians meet the needs of those in their local community and are supported by the St. Louis Council.

"It has become a tremendous effort!" Henke exclaimed. "Joining up with the Society has been very rewarding ... to help all these people who just don't have much. And okay, maybe they made a bad decision here or there, but they need our help. They need food, clothing and a roof over their heads."

Today, there are conferences at both Immaculate Conception and Sacred Heart Parish in Troy. Combined, the two Conferences work to care for people in need across all of Lincoln County with its neighbors sprawled across 640 square miles to the north and west of St. Louis.

Through the funding by the St. Louis Council's Bridge to Stability Program, a Conference is empowered to meet needs that fall beyond its own resources. The Bridge to Stability Program is a unique partnership where the St. Louis Council provides key funding to "bridge the gap" for an individual or family, and the Conference carries out the work itself. Assistance to Jim Lampson (see story, page 4) was made possible by the Bridges Program.

Susan Kallash Bailey and Barb Tucker at the Sacred Heart Conference in Troy agree (see Sacred Heart Food Pantry photo below). "Without the Bridge to Stability Program we would never have the funds to help at the

level we are now helping people get to a better place," they note. "It has allowed a lot of people to get through some very rough times ... We are so grateful."

The beneficiaries of that support are also very grateful. Henke recalls one elderly lady with cancer who had a \$650 unpaid utility bill. The Conference was able to take care of that for which she was extremely appreciative. "Many people just break down and cry when they see what we're going to be able to do," he says.

Another Elsberry family of seven was scraping by with space heaters because they couldn't afford a furnace repair. Through the Bridge to Stability Program, the Immaculate Conception Conference replaced the furnace for \$2,000. "They were so excited that their kitchen wasn't 50 degrees anymore," Henke recalls. "We also helped with some hospital bills to get them in a little better position and able to catch up." Now, that family is self-sufficient once again.

"People we help are very thankful for all we do," Henke says. "The hugs go on and on ... they just can't believe at times that people are going to help them like this."
